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## Abandoned gem mines near me

The mountains around the Blue Ridge Parkway are some of the oldest in the world, and the complex mountain building process of squeezing, folding, faulting, and fracturing rock has left the area rich in mineral deposits. Below is a list containing brief descriptions of minerals and gems found along the Blue Ridge Parkway. The mountains near Franklin, N.C. are known for rubies, sapphires, and garnets; Gran Pine, N.C. is known for emeralds, aquamarines, and quartz; and the mountains of western North Carolina have a rich history of gold mining. Along the length of the Blue Ridge Parkway, there are many commercial gem mines. Save mining usually occurs in groups and has no age limit, making it an excellent family friendly activity for Parkway visitors. Most pearl mines offer buckets of native or enriched coarse material that are sifted through to reveal beautiful stones. Visitors sit on a flume, a long trough of running water, and use a screen box to sift through dirt and find treasures. Many pearl mines will make and sell souvenir items, like jewelry, from the stones that you find. See more in Virtual Blue Ridge Travel Directory Use minerals like Gemstones Gemstones are identified and classified by four features: color, cut, clarity and carat (the 4 C's). When classifying gemstones into consumer applications in jewelry, these traits support the average consumer in understanding a gemstone value. Color is usually the main feature, and in colorless stones, like diamonds, the cut has the greatest impact on the gemstone's shine. For a colored gemstone like turquoise, color and clarity would have more bearing. Carats are simply a matter of size and weight. Moh's Scale of Hardness Another feature, hardness, is determined by Moh's Scale. It was created in 1812 by the German mineralogist, Friedrich Mohs. Most gemstones have a hardness of 7 or higher on this scale. To determine the relative hardness of an unknown mineral, you can use scratch testing. For example: if the mineral in question is able scratch a surface as apathy (a 5 on the scale), then you know its hardness rates above a 5.0. However, if the mineral in question is able to be scratched by apatite then you know its relative harness is below a 5.0. Further tests had to be done to narrow the exact hardness of the mineral. Gemstones with high levels on Moh's Scale of Hardness are used in industries from construction (to hardening borebits) to computers (quartz clocking frequencies). This dig even at Hogg Mine, is mostly for adults and is a real opportunity to dig for real, one-of-a-kind beads and crystals hidden deep beneath the earth's surface. How it works at Hogg Mine in LaGrange, Georgia, is that specific Dig Dates will be published for the year and no reservations are needed - simply show up at the venue and you will caravan to the mine. There will be a short safety talk and a tour of the mine which is important especially for beginners and you will learn what to look for during the excavation process. The coolest part about digging into Hogg Mine is that you never know what you'll come across - whether it's an aquamarine crystal or a smoky crystal with amethyst tips. You can also find within Hogg Mine rose quartz, black tourmalin, Beryl, and so much more - it's like a modern treasure hunt. You will need to bring your own tools for the excavation, as no tools will be provided, so expect to bring a 5-gallon bucket, pick, shovel, gloves, safety glasses, chisels, a potato rake, and a sledgehammer. Come prepared because you are 100 miles from the nearest full grocery store when you visit this Nevada institution.
